What Can Be Done To Protect Workers From Fire-Related Injury?

After a firm has complied with the provisions of the local fire and building code; fire safety is a matter of providing workers with education and motivating them to learn life-safety procedures. I believe that the following management actions contribute to fire safety;

- 1. Go beyond minimum life safety code provisions, use reflective arrows, markers, and intelligent exit signs to assist in evacuation.
- 2. Prepare a written Employee Emergency Action Plan. (29 CFR 1910.38).
- 3. Prepare a written Fire Prevention Plan. (29 CFR 1910.39).
- 4. Maintain fire doors & other life safety/ fire compartmentation / suppression equipment.
- 5. Mandate 'Good Housekeeping' in all work areas & keep egress paths open at all times.
- 6. Inspect for electrical code violations leading cause of fires.
- 7. Purchase safety cabinets and safety cans to store all flammable liquids used on site.
- 8. Teach the hazards and precautions for the flammable liquids used in the workplace.
- 9. Teach how to recognize the alarm and evacuate the building in the event of a fire.
- 10. Have frequent, (at least annually) fire drills. Have observers critique performance.
- 11. Teach employees the "Drop and Roll" technique for clothing fires.
- 12. Teach employees first aid and CPR provide good response equipment and supplies.
- 13. Teach employees how to correctly use fire blankets, if available on the floor.
- 14. Teach basic operating principles for the use of portable suppression equipment.
- 15. Provide "Flame Resistant" lab coats, uniforms or coveralls to 'at risk' employees.
- 16. Insist that employees wear Arc-flash rated PPE when performing maintenance tasks.
- 17. Prohibit smoking except in designated safe areas second leading cause of fires.
- 18. Subsidize the purchase of safety equipment for the home, i.e., smoke detectors.
- 19. Sponsor, "Brown-Bag" lunch discussions about relevant topics, i.e., static, lightning, etc
- 20. Sponsor awareness programs during Fire Prevention Week (Early October). E.D.I.T.H.
